### NEW TEAM TAKES OVER THE MANTLE OF GOPIO INTERNATIONAL

Global Organization of People of Indian Origin (GOPIO) completed its election early last month and the new team was sworn-in on March 4th at a virtual Zoom ceremony with veteran community leader from New York Mr. Lal Motwani as its president. Motwani has been a Founder Life member from GOPIO inception in 1989 and was serving as the International Coordinator-at-Large and later as Executive Trustee of GOPIO Foundation in his last term. Motwani initiated GOPIO's first chapter, which was inaugurated by former Indian President late Dr. K.R, Narayanan in 2003. Others sworn in at the ceremony are media and community leader Mr. Umesh Chandra from Brisbane, Australia as Executive Vice President; Los Angeles area community leader Kewal Kanda as Vice President, New Jersey businessman Prakash Shah as Global Ambassador and former IBM official and community activist Ms. Jasbir 'Nami' Kaur as International Coordinator-at-Large.

Five more Regional International Coordinators were sworn-in as follows: Businessman Roger Latchman from Johannesburg, South Africa as Africa Coordinator; Engineering Entrepreneur Deo Gosine (Trinidad and New York) as Caribbean Coordinator; Real Estate Investor Ashok Madan of Southern California as North America Coordinator; former engineer Harmohan Singh Walia of Sydney, Australia as Oceania Coordinator and New Delhi businessman Dhiraj Ahuja as South Asia Coordinator. Two others, Dr. Asha Samant of New Jersey (USA), Intl. Coordinator-at-Large and Mr. Ved Prakash Goojha, International Coordinator for Europe, were declared elected but couldn't join the oath ceremony. The new Executive Council appointed Mr. Sohan Joshi as Treasurer. GOPIO Chairman Dr. Thomas Abraham will continue till the next General Body meeting which will be called by the new Executive Council. The election was conducted according to the GOPIO bylaws by a team of the Interim Committee which was appointed by the GOPIO General Body Meeting held on January 14<sup>th</sup> consisting of Mr. Ram Gadhavi (Wayne, New Jersey, USA), Mr. Mahavir Arya (Sydney, Australia) and Mr. Mridul Pathak (New York). In a spirit of unity, nominees with multiple nominations withdrew from their multiple nominations except one, making it a unanimous choice for all positions.

The ceremony started with a universal prayer song by Ms. Devika Gadhavi, who is a young professional working for the New York Times. Dr. Thomas Abraham, Chairman of GOPIO welcomed the participants from all continents and provided a brief introduction to the birth of GOPIO and many of its achievements in the last 34 years. Dr. Abraham also highlighted the great services provided by GOPIO Chapters during the pandemic such as providing food to the frontline workers at the beginning of the lockdown, getting N95 masks to the hospitals, replenishing food pantries and sending oxygen concentrators to India when the pandemic was at its highest level.

"GOPIO chapters around the world have been doing a lot of organizational ground work in many countries to promote leadership in public service and the thrust have been to promote and involve the Indian Diaspora in the larger society and local communities wherever they live," said Dr. Abraham.

In his acceptance speech, President Motwani said, "We will soon activate those regions which are not active now and we will get all the councils to become active again. We need many volunteers to get involved in the Councils such as Human Rights, Cultural, Academic, Women, Science and Technology, Youth and Young Professionals, Media, Health and Wellness and on Seniors. We will officially launch GOPIO Chamber of Commerce (GICC) in different parts of the world."

Congratulating the new team, former GOPIO President Niraj Baxi said that the ceremony on March 4<sup>th</sup> signifies marching forward for GOPIO.

The program ended with a melodious Bollywood celebration song by GOPIO-Edison President Pallavi Belwariar of New Jersey.

The newly elected President Dr. Jaya Daptardar spoke about the recent fundraiser. She said "On Feb 6<sup>th</sup> earthquake struck southern and central Turkey and northern and western

Syria. GOPIO CT executive team came together in raising funds for Turkey disaster relief. Our GOPIO CT immediate past president Mr. Ashok Nichani contacted Turkey embassy and found resources to send the required aid. We couldn't find reliable resources to send relief to Syria but we did as much as we could for the survivors in Turkey. Together 5000 dollars of needed supplies such as food, tent, men's and women's jackets, baby formulae, children's clothes and orthopedic supplies were sent by Turkish Airlines."

Dr. Daptardar presented the 2023 GOPIO events and activities overview which includes a seminar on investments and tax tips in April, Health and Wellness seminar in May on Mental Health as part of the Mental Health Awareness, "Hope in Motion' Walkathon on June 11<sup>th</sup> to raise funds for Bennet Cancer Center of the Stamford Hospital, India Day Celebration on August 6<sup>th</sup>, Welcome Dinner for Indian students at UConn in September, Diwali party in November and partnering with community Diwali event at Ferguson library in Stamford and finally Holiday Party in December which will raise funds for a local charity.

## GOPIO CHAPTERS JOIN HANDS WITH INDIAN CONSULATE TO CELEBRATE SHAHEED DIWAS

Shaheed Diwas or Martyrs' Day is observed on six days across India which includes January 30<sup>th</sup> and March 23<sup>rd</sup> each year to remember the sacrifices of the brave freedom fighters who devoted their entire lives to help us enjoy freedom.

As India and the people of Indian origin living around the world enjoy freedom, liberty, equality and success, it's due to the sacrifices, vision and foresight of men and women who dedicated their lives at the cause of freedom, fighting for independence from the 200years of British Rule. There are millions who dedicated their lives, while there are some whose leadership and bravery inspired millions of others to fight for freedom.

Global Organization of People of Indian Origin (GOPIO) along with its chapters in the New York area (Manhattan, New York, Edison and Central Jersey) joined hands with the Consulate General of India in New York to organize and honor the martyrs during a virtual celebration of Shaheed Diwas 2023, which is the 92<sup>nd</sup> death anniversary of three courageous youngsters Shaheed Bhagat Singh, Shivaram Rajguru and Sukhdev Thapar on March 18, 2023.

The celebrations, started with a welcome remark by GOPIO-Manhattan Co-Secretary Emcee Bhavya Gupta, touched many hearts as the hundreds of participants heard personal stories shared by family members of some of these brave men and women, who fought valiantly and gave up their lives at the altar of freedom for India. Bhavya then introduced the other Emcee of the event, poet and writer Anoop Bhargava, who spoke on the importance of Martyr's Day. Bhargava sai, "On March 23 in 1931, three brave men, Bhagat Singh, Sukhdev Thapar, and Shivaram Rajguru were hanged to death by Britishers, for fighting for freedom from British rule in India."

India's Consul General Randhir Kumar Jaiswal opened with Jai Hind. He shared his journey of 25-years since starting in the Indian Foreign Service in 1998 and pointed to the nine-fold growth in the same period within India. He further added that the next 25-years, known as Amrit Kal (100-years of independence); India will grow 9-fold or more. He praised the contributions of the Martyrs that led to the last 75-years of success and called upon the Indian Diaspora to join him this year and convey the message of India as it leads G20 Presidency to the people across the world. Also, this year India celebrates the International Year of Millets 2023 or Shree Anna (means auspicious). Millets are less consuming of water and highly nutritious. The program started with a welcome by GOPIO Chair for the event and emcees Mr. Anoop Bhargava and Ms. Bhavya Gupta. GOPIO International Chairman Dr. Thomas Abraham, who also serves as an advisor to GOPIO-Manhattan, encouraged the speakers to mentor, motivate and guide the youngsters especially the new students from India to the US.

Dr. Abraham said, "GOPIO caters to the 32 million Indian Diaspora. GOPIO has done pioneering work in connecting the diaspora with the motherland. He asked the distinguished speakers to join the attendees in celebrations those who were martyred and devoted their life for India"

Vermont State Senator Ms. Kesha Ram reflected on her roots and the involvement of her families during the partition of India and Pakistan. That event displaced millions and numerous lives were lost. Her Great-Great Grandfather was Shri Gangaram upon whom there is a hospital named in the Capital--New Delhi and Lahore, Pakistan."

Dr. Bhuvan Lall, Film Producer, Entrepreneur, Speaker, Scriptwriter and Columnist, New Delhi, India. Author of The Man India Missed The Most - Subhas Chandra Bose & The Great Indian Genius – Har Dayal, reminded the audience of the importance of various dates before and after March 23<sup>rd</sup> starting with Jan 30<sup>th</sup>, Feb 27<sup>th</sup>, March 23<sup>rd</sup>, April 13<sup>th</sup>. Dr Lall reminded that the freedom struggle started in 1857 that caught fervor post hanging of the three martyrs and led to the freedom in 1947.

Dr. Lall narrated an incident that happened the year following on Jan 26<sup>th</sup> 1932 wherein the young men decided to march and unfurl their flag in front of the Town Hall. The police came to know and were prepared for this. Five men appeared singing the song *"Jhanda Ooncha Rahe Hamara" (Our Flag Shall Fly High).* The police led a lathi charge and dissipated the crowds and went to their respective locations and celebrated their victory. Much to their surprise, they heard the same song *"Jhanda Ooncha Rahe Hamara"* being sung by women with the flag in their hands headed to Town Hall. By the time Police got time to react, a large crowd gathered with the Flag almost ready to plant it at the Town Hall.

Dr. Neerja Arun Gupta, Vice Chancellor of Sanchi University for Buddhist and Indic Studies, added her comments on the occasion with Swaraj as a movement and highlighted the sacrifices of the martyrs. India is changing and Indians are becoming more Bhartiya. The growth is attributed due to the Swaraj or the Freedom Movement and the benefits are being seen today post overcoming the colonial hangover. The movie Shaheed, personified the struggle of Bhagat Singh as portrayed by Shri Manoj Kumar and his mother's role as essayed by Kamini Kaushal, the line that resonated with the citizens was the strength of the mother of Bhagat Singh "*Tu Na Rona kyon ki Tu Hai Bhagat Singh Ki Maa*" (Do not shed a tear as youre the mother of Bhagat Singh)".

Kavi Gajendra Solanki mesmerized the audience with this spirited narration of the poerty related to Martyr's Day... His narration got the audience reinvigorated with this voice and message.

Mr. Lal Motwani, President of GOPIO International, in his remarks gave a background of his family during the partition and how they navigated from Lahore to Punjab India."

Dr. Manu Bhagwan, Professor of History and Human Rights at Hunter College and the Graduate Center-The City University of New York, and Senior Fellow at the Ralph Bunche Institute, illustrated the freedom struggle and provided an insight on the message of Mahatma Gandhi and Bhagat Singh. Both Gandhi and Bhagat Singh called on us to believe in something larger than ourselves and larger than themselves to hold on to some key values to recognize some essential truths and to fight for broader ideals to honor the sacrifices that they made and to recall these values of truths and ideals and to understand that the aspiration for these is ongoing and in fact Eternal and that it is through our constant quest for them that our Shaheeds/Martyrs achieve immortality.

Prof. Bhagwan said, "Bhagat Singh and Gandhi are often contrasted for having different visions one that of a young revolutionary and the other the apostle of non-violence yet the

two were closer in both means and ends than is commonly thought; both dreamed of a more equal and just world free from oppression and once imprisoned Bhagat Singh and his friends got recognition for *Fighting For Better Conditions* for those in jail specifically deploying a tactic more commonly associated with Gandhi a *fasting hunger strike* -- this non-violent form of self-suffering from Gandhi's point of view was premised on the belief that all of us and each of us are connected in deep and profound ways through what Gandhi called the bond of love."

Cultural Consul Vipul Dev from the Indian Consulate summarized the event "Keep the memories of our Martyrs alive and it's very important to let the future generations of our diaspora especially the children who are born and brought up here in the United States to acquaint them with the glorious history of India's Freedom struggle." He further added, "It took immense courage and immense sacrifices by the Shaheeds on their part, imagine someone you know as young as 23 years old like Bhagat Singh was and their other companions they were young men in their 20s, some were in their 30s, but imagine the kind of courage and sacrifice that they chose so we should learn and we should take inspiration from their life and we should understand their message and take it forward."

Consul Dev further said, "As we gather at the Consulate General of India with our community who are regular at our events and who are connected with us, that this year we are celebrating the 75th year of India's independence, Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav and as part of that series of celebrations we are remembering so many of our freedom fighters especially those who we consider unsung heroes."

Shivender Sofat, President of GOPIO-Manhattan, in his passionate address, shared about the sacrifices of Freedom Fighters. "This is part of a series of events to pay homage to martyrs of India," he said. "It was planned in 2019, but today, we are fortunate to have this virtually connecting all of us from around the world for this solemn event." While referring to the different paths used by the freedom fighters, he said, "They all had one goal: freedom for our motherland. Our real homage to the martyrs is to work towards by preserving the ideals of the martyrs." He led the audience from around the world to salute India and the Martyrs in one voice, as they all called out *"Inquilab Zindabad."*

The host for the evening, Ambassador Randhir Kumar Jaiswal, commented, "Namaste to all Young friends. A very warm welcome to the Consulate, your Home and my office."

He further highlighted there are two sets of students we deal with, one that are here and the others that come here from India. This Student Meet & Greet is an effort in the direction of you connecting with each other and being there as you grow in this new land of opportunities. We are the fifth largest economy and climbing to become the third largest economy. He added that there are 1 million students among the 34 million Diaspora are going to play a very important role in that and be the real champions."

Consulate official Ms. Satpadi Tagore invited GOPIO International Chairman Dr. Thomas Abraham for his remarks. Dr. Abraham serves as an advisor to GOPIO-Manhattan and started with "Namaskar and addressed the students by reflecting on his journey fifty years ago with an example that a simple phone call back home would cost around \$3/minute. There was a concept of host families. With the advancement of technologies and ease of communication and growth in students, there is no more such need of host families. Starting in 2021 and following session in Oct 2022, and today, we are hosting these sessions to connect you with the community, professional achievers and the Consulate for help with issues or in case of emergency. He noted the number of students across Columbia, NYU, Pace, SUNY Bufallo, Touro College, UPenn, NJIT and other universities represented in the room."

Mr. Srikanth Jagabathula, Robert Stansky Research Faculty Fellow and Associate Professor of Tech, Ops, and Stats at the NYU Stern School of Business, moderated the panel starting with giving each speaker a min to talk about their background. He channeled the conversations across the topics of immigration to job search to internships, teaching assistantships etc. with the fellow speakers and engaged the audience. He shared his experiences with the students and said, "Wear different hats, multi-task, go out of your comfort zone, explore and discover."

GOPIO-Manhattan Executive Vice President Professor Rajasekhar Vangapaty spoke about the importance of on-campus job and securing the teaching assistant role while at campus and its importance in job search. He added that "every skill-set you learn in your life will definitely benefit you somewhere in your lifetime. Never get discouraged, if you get hurdles." He emphasized on the fact that "do not guess the answers. If you don't know, ask. Whether you're given or not that's a different story."

Ms. Sanjyot Dunung, CEO & Founder of Atma Global, shared her experiences with the students about her journey from India to England to Chicago as she experienced the culture shifts. She added that it doesn't necessarily matter at what age you move to a new country. The concept of culture shock, learning new values, attitudes, understanding how people do things, can be startling at the very beginning. She bridged the two cultures with every summer trip to India to retain and touch that Indian cultural experience. She indulged the panel to assist students in formulating their choices of major and career path.

Mr. Anthony Irudhyanathan, President Zillion Technologies shared his journey as an Entrepreneur in the technology sector, started with \$400. He reflected on his journey and cited his motivation to be here was based on the fact that the Students from India have the chance to be a Game Changer and that he invests in the ideas from Students, a support not available when he started his journey in 1998. This platform of Meet & Greet is a good opportunity for Students to excel in being a game changer as 60% of top 100 companies have Indians as CIO/CTOs today. He added "students should immerse within the system, learn and connect with the people."

Mr. Akshat Tewary, an immigration attorney added "reflected on his journey to the USA in Jan 1986 highlighting the sense of expectation, optimism, growth etc. as the cultural differences between homeland and USA."

She further added that we encourage the students to think of the career, plan for the present, think about the future, but come back to the present.

Mr. Shivender Sofat, President GOPIO-Manhattan, who joined virtually told the importance of mentoring to the students, discussed chapter activities and motivated everyone to volunteer and become members at future events held by GOPIO Manhattan.

Mr. Siddharth Jain, GOPIO Manhattan Board Member concluded with a quote from Rumi: *"It's your road, and yours alone, others may walk it with you, but no one can walk it for you."* 

Mr. Jain followed the quote with the vote of thanks to Host Ambassador Shri Randhir Kumar Jaiswal, Dy. Consul Shri Varun Jeph, Dr. Thomas Abraham, Distinguished Panelists, Ms. Satabdi Tagore and the Consulate staff.
